Upper Coochin Creek Environmental Reserve is one of the hidden gems of the Sunshine Coast, with Coochin Creek flowing through it and a wide variety of animals who use the beautiful big old trees for habitat. The reserve includes cascades, significant rock faces and ridges, rare lowland rainforest and other ecosystems.

The group are a small and dedicated group of friendly volunteers who hold monthly working bees. They started in 2013 and focus mainly on removing environmental weeds to encourage natural bush regeneration. The group were successful in applying for a grant to undertake a revegetation project and spent the majority of 2016 completing this project.

Each working bee is finished off with morning tea and a chat. New people are always welcome to attend.





The Friends of Cahills Scrub is a group of mostly local volunteers who are committed to preserving the beautiful subtropical rainforest found along the upper Stanley River catchment.

The group was originally formed four years ago by group leader Ted Prickett. Under Ted's guidance the volunteers have removed lantana and other invasive exotic plant species, and have committed to restoring the rainforest's disturbed edges by planting locally occurring rainforest species.

This group formed in 2015 to assist with the environmental restoration including weed removal and planting of local species to improve areas identified in the Management Zones in the Tall Gums Environmental Reserve, and the control of weed species inside the Botanic Gardens beyond the regularly maintained formal parts.

Members have been active in using fauna cameras to determine which species are present and so far have managed to film koalas on three separate occasions as well as the more common fauna such as monitors, turkeys and swamp wallabies as well as pest species such as foxes and dogs.

So far group members have planted over 1500 native plants and cleared significant areas of Lantana and other weeds. The group enjoys the social activity and hard work and seeing gradual improvement in areas that have been worked.

The Traill Park Bushcare Group in Maroochydore formed in 1996 and is one of council's longest standing active bushcare groups. Over the years thousands of native plants were established and loads of dumped hard rubbish was removed with the help of local residents, the broader community and school students. The bushcare group has created an intact and relatively weed free bushland island in the middle of busy suburbia and has become a haven for wildlife such as birds and reptiles. Montville's Russell Family Park Bushcare Group have been meeting weekly since 2008. The group originally began restoring an area of rainforest on the western side of the main lagoon, and has progressively worked throughout most of the vegetated areas surrounding the lagoons. Large weedy trees such as camphor laurels and privet have been removed and replaced with thousands of native rainforest plant species, comprising of 166 different species.. The Bushcare group has hosted several large planting and mulching activities with participants including students from the Montville State School, volunteers from Maleny-Blackall Range Lions Club and the wider community. Rehabilitating the rainforest has enriched the habitat for native birds, animals and butterflies and an extensive list of birds have since been recorded.

Kirbys Road Environmental Reserve was purchased by Sunshine Coast Council in 2011 under the Environment Levy Land Acquisition Program. The reserve is located in the upper Mary River catchment with permanent and seasonal creeks flowing into the lowland reaches of Obi Obi Creek. The site encompasses diverse landscape features including river flats, hill slopes, several rock outcrops and a large rocky escarpment.
